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The Board of Education of the School District of Columbia, Boone County, Missouri, met in regular session at the Administration Building, 1818 West Worley Street, at the hour of 6:30 p.m., Central Daylight Time, Monday, the 13th day of October, 2014. Call to Order

The meeting was called to order by President King at 6:27 p.m.

The first matter of business was consideration of the agenda for the October 13, 2014, meeting of the Board of Education. It was moved by Mr. Whitt that the agenda be approved. The vote was 7 yes—0 no.

Consent Agenda

The Board considered approval of the minutes of the regular meeting of the Board of Education on September 8, 2014; the minutes of the special and executive sessions of the Board of Education held on September 18, 2014; acceptance of the treasurer's report; approval of bills; approval of personnel recommendations; and approval of business transactions.

The monthly treasurer's report had been previously provided to the Board of Education by Ms. Quinley. The report showed a beginning balance for the month of September in the amount of \$87.87 million, cash receipts of \$8.39 million, cash disbursements of \$18.60 million, and an ending balance of \$77.66 million. The \$77.66 million was invested in government securities in the amount of \$67.30 million and daily investment accounts in the amount of \$10.36 million. The average interest rate for all investments was 0.20%.

The Board of Education had previously been provided a detailed report of bills and expenditures for the month of September 2014. The report totaled 345 pages. The following is a listing and summary of the bills as provided to the Board of Education:

Dr. Lou Ann Tanner-Jones, MO-CASE Outstanding New Special Education Administrator

Director of Special Services Dr. Lou Ann Tanner-Jones was recognized for her receipt of the Outstanding New Special Education Administrator Award by the Missouri Council of Administrators of Special Education.

Jan Mees, Missouri School Boards Association Paul Morris Community Service Award Finalist

Columbia Board of Education member Jan Mees was honored for her achievement as a finalist for the Missouri School Boards Association's Paul Morris Community Service Award.

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Public Comment

No public comments were offered.

Board President's Report

Reports from Columbia Missouri State Teachers Association and Columbia Missouri National Education Association Susie Adams, president of the Columbia Missouri State Teachers Association, and Susan McClintic, Columbia Missouri National Education Association president, presented reports from their respective organizations on recent and future activities.

Discussion of Amendment 3

At the Board's September 18, 2014, meeting, Board members approved a resolution expressing the Board of Education's opposition to Amendment 3, a proposed amendment to the Missouri Constitution that will be on the November 4, 2014, ballot. Mike Reid of the Missouri School Boards Association presented information about the amendment, which would affect control of such issues as teacher evaluations, teacher tenure, and teacher promotion and retention. Discussion of the amendment then took place.

Discussion of Policy ECA, "Building and Grounds Security"

President King led a discussion of policy ECA, "Building and Grounds Security," and the issue of allowing the district's Coordinator and Assistant Coordinator of Safety and Security to carry a firearm. Kelli Hopkins of the Missouri School Boards Association presented information on House Bill 656, which was vetoed by the governor but the veto later overridden by the state legislature. This bill allows teachers and administrators to carry concealed weapons, but the proposed changes to Columbia Public Schools' policy ECA would allow only two specific employees (the Coordinator and Assistant Coordinator of Safety and Security) to carry concealed weapons. Dr. Stiepleman indicated this policy will be discussed at the next meeting of the Board of Education Policy Committee on Monday, October 20, 2014.

Superintendent's Report

Report on Opportunity: Bright Futures, Restorative Practices, Poverty Work, Equity Teams

Dr. Stiepleman reiterated the district's mission, vision, purpose, and core values. He reviewed the district's organizational goals, which are:

- 1. We will be fiscally responsible with taxpayer money.
- 2. We will partner with the community to help children enter school ready to succeed.
- 3. Students will read on level by the end of third grade.
- 4. We will actively support student transitions.
- 5. Students will graduate with the necessary skills to enroll in college and/or a career program of their choice.
- 6. Ninety percent of students will attend school at least ninety percent of the time.
- 7. Out-of-school suspension numbers will decrease for all student groups.
- 8. Students will demonstrate academic progress as measured by state accountability systems.

The focus of the presentation was improving attendance, decreasing suspensions, and improving achievement for the super subgroup (which includes students receiving free or reduced-price meals, students with an IEP, English Language Learners, Hispanics, and African-Americans). Dr. Dana Clippard, Deputy Superintendent, discussed the data team process and how it improves instruction by collecting and analyzing data and prioritizing learning needs. Dr. Eryca Neville, principal of Douglass High School; and Kim Nuetzmann, Fellows Program coordinator, discussed equity teams and equity training. Jerome Sally, assistant principal at Hickman High School, presented information on restorative practices. Ben Tilley, Assistant Superintendent for Elementary Education; Kelly Off, first grade teacher at Russell Boulevard Elementary School; and Kristina Neurohr, a second grade teacher at Derby Ridge Elementary school presented information on teaching with poverty in mind. Mr. Tilley also discussed Bright Futures, a way to engage communities and individuals to support individual student needs that cannot be met with school district resources.

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New Business

Consideration of Program and Budget Requests

Ms. Mees noted there were four separate items being presented for consideration; she moved that the item on piloting girls' lacrosse at district high schools be removed for separate consideration, and that the other requests (addition of 4.0 FTE paraprofessionals to help meet the needs of students with IEPs, 1.0 FTE paraprofessional for a student on a 504 plan, and 2.0 FTE HVAC personnel to manage filter replacement cycles in district buildings) be approved as presented. After discussion, the vote was 7 yes—0 no.

Ms. Mees moved that the piloting of girls' lacrosse at district high schools be considered as a budget item for the 2015-16 school year. After Board discussion and comments from athletic directors Matt Hale (Battle High School), J.D. Coffman (Hickman High School), and David Egan (Rock Bridge High School), public comments were received from the following individuals:

There was no further business to come before the Board, and it was moved by Mr. Whitt that the meeting be adjourned. The vote was 7 yes—0 no. The meeting was declared adjourned at 9:10 p.m.
